The wrestling Lions again proved that Lanphier is No. 1 by defeating both Springfield and Southeast in the city wrestling tournament.

Along with the victory, the Lions also set a new city scoring record of 113 total team points.

The Lions were led by Ed Ferguson who won his third city title at the 132 lbs. weight class, while Mike Redpath and Anthony Pankey each won their second title at 105 lbs. and 119 lbs. respectively.

Other title winners were Greg Marbold at 98 lbs., Dan Shaffer at 138 lbs. and Gary Stover at 155 lbs.

On the J-V side, LHS took the city title. Championships went to Robert Letz at 105 lbs.; Pat Spencer, 112 lbs.; Lennie Rose, L26 lbs.; J. R. Alexander, 132 lbs.; Rod Barrow, 138 lbs.; Carry Houston, 145; Dan Wells at 155; and heavy weight Dave Rodgers. Coach Ron Kruger stated that four wrestlers; Letz, Rose, Houston, and Rodgers; showed outstanding wrestling skills in their bouts.

Have you ever been sitting in the library and then all of a sudden hear a funny noise? No, it's not the termites. It's Mr. James Caruso's battery operated code practicer. Mr. Caruso is working for his amateur ham radio license. Mr. Caruso built the machine himself.

Ms. Jessie Leach, LHS's other librarian, has already passed her test and received her license.

To get a license you must know Morse Code, ham radio rules and be able to tap out messages in a certain amount of time.

A ham radio operator may send messages four different ways. One is by continuous wave, or the beep-dash method or by speaking into a transmitter. Another way is like television. The messages flash

onto the receiver's screen as a still picture. Typed messages may be sent and have them come out on paper at the receiving end.

Thanks to Oscar 8, ham's satellite, messages can be heard all over the world.

To know more about ham radios enroll in the classes that started February 6 at the Red Cross Building on South Sixth Street. A bulletin board in the library will be set aside for the ham radio information.

Richard Drevfuss and Marsha Mason are brilliantly teamed together in "The Goodbye Girl", so brilliantly in fact, that both of them received a Golden Globe award for their performances

"The Goodbye Girl" also stars 10 year old Quinn Cummings, who deserves some type of award in her own right. She is excellent as Mason's daughter. The child seems to have the IQ of a highly intelligent adult

Dreyfuss portrays Elliot, a somewhat idiotic actor. In his first big chance at stardom. Elliot portrays the title lead in Shakespeare's"Richard the III." Brazilians Attend Lanphier

Paulo Reis Neto is a foreign exchange student from Sao Paulo, Brazil. He started the second semester at Lanphier on February 1. Another foreign exchange student from Brazil is Christiane Renck. She is if more Porto Alegre. She will stay in the US for six months. She is staying with the Aut family.

Paulo has been in Springfield since January 24. Paulo speaks Portuguese, the native language of Brazil (don't even ask him if he speaks Spanishl) and is quite fluent in English.

Paulo is very up-to-date on the United States, Illinois and Lincoin in particular. He says that life in Sao Paulo, a city of 11 million, is much like that of any other metropolitan city-complete with McDonald's. Paulo is often surrised by Americans' lack of

knowledge of Brazil. He is quick to explain that there are no jungles in Brazil and that Sao Paulo is much like an American city.

He attends LHS in hopes that he will improve his English. According to Paulo, learning English is much easier than Portuguese. He has studied English for two years in Brazil.

Since the average temperature in Brazil ranges between 70 and 80 degrees, Paulo has never seen snow before. He says, "It's beautiful to see, but not so beautiful to be in-cold." Another thing he discovered for the first time in tUS is waffles. He loves them.

Paulo, who is 16, hopes to become a civil engineer. He will stay with Mark Monroe's (a junior at LHS) family for the remainder of his six months visit.
