

Lions Swamp Beardstown 44-7

Bill Stone played his last game last Friday night, when he piled up 25 points against Beardstown, as his mates won over Beardstown High 44 to 7.

This performance gave Stone a total of 107 points for seven games. He had 82 before turning on the steam against Beardstown.

Stone's first touchdown came three minutes after the kickoff, when he hit center, cut to the side and dashed 50 yards to pay dirt. From there on it was a parade. Roberts, Lanphier end, intercepted a Beardstown pass a few minutes later and galloped 45 yards.

The quarter ended with Lanphier on top, 14 to 0. They added two more touchdowns in the second leaving the field with a halftime score of 26 to 0. Beardstown scored its only touchdown late in the third quarter, and set the stage for Lanphier's longest run at the kickoff for the second half. Taking the ball, the Carter tribe put on its first threat, carrying the ball straight down field to the 10 yards line, where Lanphier held for downs.

On the first play, Juarez broke loose for a 90 yard gallop to score. They added another in the same frame and seventh tally in the last. Carmen Yannone, plunging fullback, and Frank Ramirez, who is to replace Stone in the backfield, both piled up plenty of yardage for the Lions.
